The Cycles of Life

Our Christmas Eve services at St. Timothy's were a delightful and glorious offering to God this year. They are that every year, of course, but this year was particularly beautiful and inspiring. And that's because so many people did so much to make it happen: from dragging decorations out of the rifle range (most priests can't write those words) to ordering and arranging poinsettias to practicing choral pieces to parking across the street to make room for visitors . . . and on and on. So many people doing so many big and little things, and the result was that God was richly praised. It makes my soul smile when I think back on that night. And next year, we get to do it all again!

The annual celebration of the birth of Christ happens quite predictably every year. No matter what is going in our lives or in the world, Christmas is always coming. We know the exact date each time. And there are all sorts of other events in our common life where we know the exact date. This month, we'll have the Annual Meeting on the third Sunday in January and celebrate St. Timothy's Day on the fourth Sunday, just like we always do. And later on in the year, we'll bless some bikes, honor our graduates, go to a baseball game, have a spaghetti dinner, bless some animals, attend Diocesan Convention, and then decorate the church for the Candlelight Walk, the first Sunday in December.

It's all very predictable and knowable and expected. Like clockwork, you might say. If people still wore watches, you could set your watch to it. But you can also set your life to it. These yearly cycles we go through together are what shape our common life in the church, much like the liturgy we do together shapes our weekly life in the church. Predictable, knowable, and expected.

But then there is Easter. Did you notice that I left that out of the list of what's coming up? That's because in the year 325, the Council of Nicaea decided that Easter would be held on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the vernal equinox . . . except on a Sunday. Unlike all these other things in our common life, Easter is a moving target. We know it's coming, but we don't really know when—at least not without getting more information.

And that seems fitting somehow. Because the Resurrection of our Lord reminds us that we too shall be resurrected. We know it's coming, but we don't really know when—at least not without getting more information. And in the meantime, we live out our common life together in this wonderful, glorious, delightful little postage stamp of the Church we call St. Timothy's. Together we walk through the predictable cycles of our lives, as we wait in the hope of the resurrection to new life. There are dates we know, and dates we don't know, and they all exist in the palm of God's loving hands.

FELLOWSHIP ACTIVITIES January

Patron of the Parish



Fred W. Gates

Fred W. Gates, a Massillon civic leader and philanthropist, was born in 1895. He graduated from Dartmouth College and earned his law degree from the former William McKinley Law School in Canton. Admitted to the bar in 1932, he practiced law from his home.

Early in his career he was employed by the Central Steel Co. and Peerless Drawn Steel Co. He worked as a public accountant for a time in the Canton office of Ernst and Ernst.

The youngest of four children of Charles and Mary Gates, he grew up on Fourth Street, Northeast, in an 1889 victorian beauty. He and his wife Madaleine, Washington High School's first home economics teacher,

moved into that home in the 1940s, shortly after their marriage. They refashioned it extensively to make it seem more like the Southern homes of Mrs. Gates's youth. The couple bequeathed the stately home to St. Timothy's at their deaths.

They had no children of their own, but their residence was a haven for the young people of the neighborhood. Like the Pied Piper, Mr. Gates led a procession of children nearly every morning as he walked downtown to take care of business. He stopped at Lincoln Way and watched that they made their way safely back home. The Gates home was widely known as the best Trick or Treat destination in town. Children collected extravagant candies, but not until they modeled their costumes and courteously met the adults who gathered to admire them. There was masquerade fun to be found year-round there, as Mr. Gates used colored pens to adorn neighborhood children with temporary tattoos and faux jewelry.

Throughout his life, Fred W. Gates affiliated himself with the organizations that he felt contributed to the town that he loved. He was elected secretary of the Massillon Public Library Board and treasurer of the Massillon Museum Committee in 1937, positions he held until 1965. He served as secretary-treasurer of the Charity School of Kendal from 1944 to 1972, judiciously allotting the trust fund left by Charity Rotch to benefit children. He was a long-time member of Massillon Rotary and presided over that organization in 1946. He volunteered on the Massillon Welfare Federation's budget committee. He was president of the Massillon Cemetery Association for many years. A World War I veteran, Fred Gates was a member of American Legion Post 221 and served as post historian for many years.

Mr. Gates was the Scoutmaster of Boy Scout Troop 2 at St. Timothy's during the 1920s, and he served on the Buckeye Council of the Boy Scouts of America from 1929 to 1946, earning the prestigious Silver Beaver, the highest regional award for adult Scouts.

At St. Timothy's, Fred Gates served on the vestry, sang in the choir, was the long-term treasurer, and looked after the endowment fund. Revered as the church historian, he penned the parish's centennial history in 1936.

After the 1974 death of Fred W. Gates, *The Independent* editorialized that he was "...a man of high principles, his friends were numerous and they held him in high esteem."
